Kurri's marvellous mural

A NEW and impressive mural has been erected near the Kurri Kurri and Heddon Greta M1 interchange. The mural was situated in that spot to attract more visitors to the

area. Cessnock City Council and RMS agreed on the site as being the most suitable. There were some difficulties in choosing this site but the community and the RMS worked hard to find a location they both agreed on.

Once approval for the construction was given, Cessnock City Council and the RMS took roughly three weeks to construct the panel safely. Then artist Peter Sesselmann from Abermain took three months to paint the wonderful mural using a creative and interesting design.

Peter Sesselmann is well-known in the community. He has painted many other murals for the community including the mural on the new Happy Tooth dentistry, the Kurri Kurri Golf Club 'Sunrise', along with many other murals in the district.

The mural is a fantastic painting costing approximately \$27,000. The cost was met by the NSW Government and The Towns with Heart Committee along with in-kind and community support.

Local resident Rod Doherty said, "This is an astonishingly fantastic support and effort put in to it."

Medical centre to open this year

THE new medical centre in Lang Street Kurri Kurri is a community health care facility which will house six constructions rooms, pathology and associated medical infrastructure. The cost of the new facility is around \$1.8 million and will be a great asset to the town.

Resident Trish Kinsley said, "The town will benefit

from this facility. There are more young people with families and they will need its services. The town is

really growing." It is estimated that by December, when it is fully operational, the centre could have around 25 to 30 employees. Funds for this project were made possible by the Commonwealth Government in 2007-2011. The government funded many new medical

super clinics across Australia. Kurri Kurri was seen as one area where new facilit-

ies were required. "The population of the Kurri Kurri district is expected to increase exponentially over the next decade, so this centre is certainly needed," Cessnock councillor Rod Doherty said.

The site is close to the CBD. is on a bus route and close to the Hunter Expressway.
