TEENAGERS take the mantle for being Australia's most expensive children, with the age of 17 being crowned the single most expensive year in a child's life, according to Suncorp Bank's Cost of Kids report.

The study showed that the cost of raising two children to the age of 21 is about \$800,000 and the main drivers of this are the big ticket items such as food, transport and recreation.

Australian children have among the highest rates of mobile ownerships in the world with parents paying an average of \$884 per year per child for smartphone and mobile phone connectivity and an average of \$468 per year per child on pocket money.

Food continues to take a big chunk of family budget, with the report revealing low-income families now spend \$89,000 on food for
