AT the end of April, wild weather hit the Hunter. It was the biggest storm to batter the Hunter in the past decade.

The storm started on Monday, April 20 and ended on Friday, April 24. Throughout that week more than 100,000 houses were affected. Trees were ripped out by their roots to fall onto houses, waterways and power lines. The wild storm meant that homes were cut off from power, water and food; a family's most vital supplies.

The floods were one of the most horrendous and devastating parts of the storm. About 4500 people were cut off by flood waters, with some townships only regaining complete access weeks after. The most affected towns were Dungog, Gillieston Heights, Hinton and Wollombi.

According to Weatherzone's Total Lightning Networks, there were over 6224 lightning strikes during the period from April 19-23.

This storm will be remembered as not only one of the worst in recent history, but with hail crashing down all over Sydney, and houses floating away in Dungog, it will also be remembered as one of the most widespread.

The SES dealt with around 12,000 calls for assistance. Most of these calls were for fallen trees and broken power lines. They reported that they performed around 100 flood rescues overnight on Tuesday, April 21 and completed around 50 per cent of the many requests for assistance. Unaffected local businesses pitched in by

offering free food, ice and shelter for those worst affected.

Along with the severe damage that impacted residents, many businesses, including schools, were disturbed. Countless primary and high schools were closed during the storm. More than 100 Catholic and public schools were closed due to the cyclonic conditions. Some staff

were cut off by floodwaters or fallen trees, unable to reach their place of employment for the entire week.

The Hunter once again pulled together as a community, facing adversity and overcoming a freak natural disaster. Over a month has passed since the storm and the Hunter is well on its way to rebuilding what was lost.
