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Erection of structural steel excites team

Bulk earthworks continue to dominate the workload at the Mount Pleasant Operation. Since commencing in late November 2016 crews have erected steel structures for a workshop in the Mine Infrastructure Area; finished part of the mine and light vehicle pavements; continued construction of the haul road; cleared the stockpile area for the Coal Handling Preparation Plant; commenced dams and erected perimeter fences.

Project Director Heather Parry was excited by the prospect of mobilising additional contractors in the coming months.

"Site is starting to take shape and our workforce continues to grow to reflect the progress we have made to date," she said.

"We can already see the early results of our hydro-mulching efforts across the batters and banks which we apply as soon as possible to reduce dust."

MACH Energy's Managing Director Scott Winter makes regular visits to site from Brisbane and remains in awe of developments with each visit.

"The locals who work on this project are extremely proud to be associated with an operation that is progressing so well within a short period of time," he said.

Despite relentless attempts from those who challenge the future of our Operation we continue to develop the Mount Pleasant Operation. Those living in the area have always embraced the future of the Operation with many of you providing positive submissions to our recent Modification. Managing Director Scott Winter said a significant number of submissions valued the boost that the Operation had provided to the local economy and opportunities it had presented.

"It was extremely humbling to read what businesses or individuals valued from the Operation to date. Quite a few local businesses recognised the injection of confidence the Operation provided due to mine closures and other domestic economic matters," he said.

"Despite on-going failed attempts to stop our work, construction is progressing as planned."

"Those driving these campaigns are completely disconnected from our mining footprint and don't appear to have any regard for how energy is generated for a reasonable cost to the broader community.

"Coal will remain an active part of the energy mix that will allow alternative energy sources to become affordable and available for more consumers."

Strategic review of Aboriginal Community Development Fund

A review of the strategic direction of the Aboriginal Community Development Fund is attracting immense support from the Fund's committee members. An intensive two-day workshop revisited the objectives of the ACDF and highlighted local issues that can be targeted through meaningful partnerships.

Committee Chair Deirdre Heitmeyer said committee members offered a range of community experiences so the focus of the workshop discussions were strategically linked to supporting local and real concerns.

"Committee members are being empowered to tackle these issues by becoming sponsors for particular programmes," she said.

"This ensures that the voices of the partners are brought back to the committee where more informed decisions can be made. This collaboration is of vital importance in tackling the issues.

"The committee is committed to forming partnerships or supporting initiatives that enhance the health and well-being of Aboriginal people in the area."

The Fund is amongst the community benefits identified in 2005 as part of the Native Title Agreement with the Wonnarua People, as represented by Victor Perry.

Each year approximately \$640,000 is available for programmes that benefit the Upper Hunter Valley Aboriginal communities.

FAST FACTS

Modification and State Significant Development processes

- The Development Consent for the Mount Pleasant Operation was originally issued in 1999 following a comprehensive Environmental Impact Statement and Commission of Inquiry. Since that time the conditions of the Development Consent have been updated on two occasions, in 2011 and most recently in 2017. This included significant update of the Development Consent conditions to meet contemporary standards.
- The validity of the Mount Pleasant Operation Development Consent was recently challenged by opponents of mining in the NSW Land and Environment Court. The court found (July 2017) that the Mount Pleasant Development Consent is in force.
- The current Modification that **MACH** Energy has proposed primarily includes two components: an extension to the time limit on open cut mining to 22 December 2026; and extensions to the Eastern Out of Pit Emplacement to facilitate a final landform more consistent with the characteristics of the local topography and to provide extra waste rock capacity in the Eastern out of Pit Emplacement.
- MACH Energy has also commenced work on a State Significant Development Application for the continuation of operations beyond 2026. The current modification would allow production to continue while the application and approval process for the SSD is finalised.

Noise

MACH Energy has prepared a contemporary operational Noise Management Plan for the Mount Pleasant Operation in accordance with our Development Consent. The NMP was submitted to Department of Planning and Environment and was approved in June 2017. **MACH** Energy will continue to conduct construction and operations to achieve the relevant Development Consent DA92/97 criteria. This includes various noise control measures, as well as a substantial noise monitoring program. Real-time noise monitoring undertaken as part of this program provides live 24-hour feedback on noise performance, which allows proactive management to minimise noise emissions.
