As you are aware in August this year I introduced a private Senator's bill – *Ensuring Northern Territory Rights Bill 2021*.

The primary purpose of the Bill was to address anomalies which have been in place nearly 25 years since the parliament of the day made changes to the *Self Government Act 1978* to overturn the *Rights of the Terminally Ill Bill* which had been passed by the Northern Territory Legislative Assembly.

At the time the Northern Territory was the first jurisdiction in Australia to introduce such laws around voluntary assisted dying (VAD). The changes enacted at the time effectively made citizens of the Northern Territory and the Australian Capital Territory second class in determining their future.

Since those changes known as the Andrews Bill every state in Australia has either introduced VAD laws or is in the process of introducing and debating those laws.

It is the intent of my bill to at the very least allow a debate around VAD to occur. My Bill is not to reinstate the *Rights of the Terminally Ill Bill* or to reinstate a form or otherwise of VAD.

I had originally included in my private Senator's bill, legislation to address issues around property acquisition and fair work as well, however, following discussion and resistance to the changes, I have now amended my Bill – a copy of which is included.

At this stage the Bill proposed by me purely covers the Northern Territory. I did not seek to include the ACT as I do not represent that jurisdiction, but should an amendment be put forward including the ACT I would not oppose it.

I urge you to consider the importance of democratic choice when so many rights of individuals are being clipped. Should this Bill pass it will allow the Northern Territory to at least debate the issue and determine if they want VAD legislation or not.

The Parliament had the right to make those laws back then, and I urge you to allow Territorians the ability to, again choose their destiny. We often say Government's should not

tell people what to do and we have held fast to that during the pandemic, on that basis I see us and Parliament gaining more by giving choice rather than denying it.

I ask for your support in ensuring all Australians have freedom of choice – not just those who live in certain parts of Australia.

Despite the repeal of the Euthanasia Laws Act 1997 and section 50A of 3 the Northern Territory (Self-Government) Act 1978 by this Schedule, 4 the Rights of the Terminally Ill Act 1995 (NT): 5 (a) continues to have effect as a law of the Territory in relation 6 to any act or thing that was done before 27 March 1997; but 7 (b) has no force or effect as a law of the Territory in relation to 8 any act or thing done on or after that day. 9 27 March 1997 is the day the Euthanasia Laws Act 1997 received the Royal Assent. 10 Note: (2) Subitem (1) applies subject to a contrary intention in a law of the 11 Northern Territory that is enacted after the commencement of this item. 12
