## Numerous dogs and cats given second chance at life

THE Glen Innes branch of the RSPCA has a particular focus on desexing at the moment, with the aim to reduce the amount of stray animals in the district.

While RSPCA's Paul Raper said the organisation's work had slowed of late in terms of strays, they are offering a special discount on the desexing of pets for people on low incomes.

"At the moment it's a bit quiet, but we are doing quite a bit on the desexing side of things," he said.

"We are doing desexing for dogs and cats for low income earners and pensioners, we are giving them a discount voucher to help them out with the costs," he said.

"Last year we desexed 24 dogs and 40 cats

### All you need is a love of animals to help out

THEIR a lots of ways you can help your local branch of the RSPCA and all you need is a love of animals to get involved in some fashion.

Becoming a member is easy and relatively cheap with an annual fee of \$30 each year for adults and \$20 for junior members and pensioners, this fee entitles members to a 10 per cent discount at any RSPCA retail outlets in NSW and at any of the four RSPCA veterinary hospitals in the state.

Volunteers are a vital part of the work undertaken by the RSPCA and people can

not microchipped, vaccinated and desexed, we then sell them for \$200 and the cost of doing all that is generally more than that."

Local RSPCA member Margaret Pennington said the organisation also has received a lot of support from the Gwydir Park Animal Refuge at Delungra.

"They are fantastic people who have helped us out a million times," she said.

"They've taken dogs we haven't been able to rehome and we have also helped them out with microchipping and desexing and vaccinating, so we have both helped each other."

Last year the Glen Innes branch rehomed 20 dogs and five cats, while one dog and seven cats were sold to Petbarn in Tamworth, two dogs and four cats were sent to shelters at Coffs

Harbour and three cats were given to the Armidale branch to rehome.

Nationally the RSPCA received 49,189 thousand dogs through 2012-2013 and 49,236 stray cats.
