Hall blueprint facilitates a floor upgrade

THERE are fantastic new additions being made to the Abermain Public School environment. The school hall has recently had several upgrades to improve the space for students.

Abermain Public School's hall was constructed in 2008, though school principal Mr Boughton had planned the blueprints in 2006. In late 2012 and early 2013, improvements to the hall have included the laying of a new floor and interior painting.

Funding for the flooring project was achieved through generous sponsorship from the United Mineworkers Federation of Australia and Harvey Norman. The flooring and painting projects were completed by staff families and community members who generously gave up their time.

A ceremony was held to celebrate the additions to the hall on March 28, with Todd Lackey representing Harvey Norman Bennetts Green and Graham Kelly representing United Mineworkers Federation of Australia presented with certificates of appreciation.

Mr Boughton said the hall has been "a great asset to the school".

Future changes are to include installation of insulation in the roof and finishing touches such as a sound system and further lighting.
