## History of women taking a stand

INTERNATIONAL Women's Day has been observed since the early 1900s, a time of great expansion and turbulence in the industrialised world that saw booming population growth and the rise of radical ideology

• 1908: Great unrest and critical debate were occurring among women. Women's oppression and inequality was spurring women to become more vocal and active in campaigning for change. Then in 1908,

15,000 women marched through New York City demanding shorter hours, better pay and voting rights.

• 1909: In accordance with a declaration by the Socialist Party of America, the first National Women's Day was observed across the US on February 28.

second International Conference of Working Women was held in Copenhagen. Clara Zetkin (leader of the Women's Office for the Social Democratic

Party in Germany) tabled the idea of an International Women's Day. She proposed that every year in every country there be a celebration on the same day – a women's day – to press for their demands. There conference of over 100 women from 17 countries, greeted Zetkin's suggested with unanimous approval.

• 1911: International Women's Day was honoured for the first time in Austria, Denmark, Germany and Switzerland on March 19. More than 1 million women and men attended rallies campaigning for women's rights to work, vote, be trained, to

hold public office and end discrimination.
• 1913-14: On the eve of World War I campaigning for peace, Russian women observed their first International Women's Day on the last Sunday in February. Following discussions, the day was transferred to March 8 and this day as remained the global date for celebration and action.

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
