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## Get your macula checked

**C**ONSIDERING the high statistics for macular degeneration in Australia – one in seven people over 50 years of age – it is important for everyone to get their macula checked by an optometrist, whether they are experiencing difficulties with their vision or not.

One million people have macular degeneration already in Australia and that figure is expected to rise to 1.7 million by 2030.

An eye examination including a macula check will reassure those without the disease, and if you are found to have early or late stage macular degeneration suitable lifestyle changes and treatment pathways can be developed.

There is plenty of support available, and you must remember that blindness does not occur in every patient with macular degeneration.

There can be little or no vision impairment in the early stages, and often it can take many years to progress to a severe defect, if at all.

Simple measures such as self monitoring with an Amsler grid (obtainable from the optometrist or the Macular Disease Foundation), dietary changes, ceasing smoking and taking recommended high dose multivitamins can also aid in slowing the progression of the disease.

Optometrists and ophthalmologists work together to assist the patient with macular degeneration as do the Macular Disease Foundation, Vision Assist and Guide Dogs.

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
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# Early detection the key

## Two types of macular degeneration

**A**GE-RELATED Macular Degeneration (AMD) affects a significant number of people over the age of 55 and can ruin quality of life if it remains untreated.

Symptoms include blurring of eyesight, such as in reading or recognising faces, and distortion of vision, where straight lines develop kinks or bends.

It can occur suddenly or slowly, in one or both eyes. AMD can run in families and smoking is a risk factor.

There are two common types of AMD: Dry and Wet.

Dry AMD is caused by slow decay of

the cells that receive light in the retina. To date there is no proven effective treatment for this type of AMD.

Therapies being researched include stem cells.

Wet AMD is caused by bleeding of fragile capillaries underneath the retina. This causes fluid to leak under and into the retina. Left untreated it leads to severe scarring and loss of vision.

Fortunately, we have an excellent treatment in the form of Lucentis, Eylea or Avastin. These drugs are injected into the eye and stop the bleeding and leakage of wet AMD.

While the thought of such an injection is perhaps a little scary, the process is actually quite painless and easy.

With early intervention, eyesight is often preserved well into the future.

Many patients retain good vision as a result of this treatment.
