

Dear Bishop,

As you can see from the above, I'm in the Philippines, same here for a couple of reasons: my doctor regards the climate in Ireland much too cold in view of my hip-injury and even more so now since I had multiple(?) Bypass Operation last October. It seems to go from a warmer to a colder climate can be very detrimental. For the operation in '93 I had to return to W.A. as I had no medical cover in Ireland (and no hope of getting it), which would have meant an initial cost of £1,500 merely for the tests (i.e. in excess of \$3,500), then anything from £5,000 to £8,000 depending on the number of Bypasses required. Medicine also is a phenomenal cost there — my \$7 monthly in Australia would run into the equivalent of in excess of \$50 in Ireland. Likewise, while in Ireland I had renewed acquaintances with some of my old Redemptorist college-mates who had been in the Philippines, and who urged me to visit others still in the P.I..

Through the good graces of a Somascan Father and some Philippine friends in Manila we visited Laguna Bay, where I met Bishop Pedro Bautista of San Pablo Diocese, and with whom I was invited to dine on 3 occasions. During my last visit (12 Sept.), I had a long talk with him and gave him my unfortunate background. He was very understanding and sympathetic and suggested that instead of just being "retired" and spending the rest of my days praying in atonement for my past mistakes, it would be more profitable to become involved also in some active work in a place and manner that would be remote from the outside world — this he would be happy to arrange.

There is a tremendous shortage of priests here, with enormous populations, not only in the cities, but in remote Barrios. It would seem an ideal opportunity to continue

Diocese. Accordingly, the Bishop has asked me to write to you,

suggesting either of 2 options :-(a) that I be excommunicated from Mainland to be incardinated in San Pablo Diocese immediately (the preferred option) & (b) to be permitted to work in San Pablo Diocese, with a view to future incardination there.

It doesn't seem that I've got too many more years of active life (or indeed any life) left to me, so, I'm really begging you to allow me to accept this opportunity of spending them in the service of God and souls. Not even my own Sister or her family need know where I am or what I'm doing; as far as they are concerned, I have "retired" to a warmer climate.

It appears you didn't receive my 2 letters I wrote from ~~to~~ and last year, so I'm making this one "Personal & Confidential". I'd request that you regard it likewise. I hope your health is continuing to improve to enable you also to be active during these remaining years prior to retirement.
