# Autumn Weddings



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### Tips to help you organise your big day

WHEN you first start planning your wedding, there are things that are nice to know, like what the hot new colour trend is, but then there are things you need to know, the essentials. These are those....

**Guests come first** 

Get an approximate number of guests you'll invite before settling on a venue.

This will ensure there's ample space for your crew. As a rule of thumb, allow for about 2.5 to three square metres per guest.

That may seem like a lot, but it's not if you count the space you'll need for the tables, bustling waiters, the band, and the dance floor.

### Keep a paper trail

Get any non-standard changes to your agreements in writing or send the supplier a confirmation email saying, "Hello, just confirming that you'll keep the venue open until 2am versus midnight."

Don't take anyone on their word — by the time the wedding day rolls around, your contact may no longer be working there to vouch for you.

### Call the fashion police

Don't go dress shopping on your own — all the gowns will start to look the same after a while and it will be harder to recall which style you really

But be careful about who you take. If your mum or sibling can't make the trip, ask a friend who is truly honest. This is the time when you really need to know which dress looks best.

### Write down your digits

Carry an emergency contact sheet on your wedding day. Keep the paper with names and phone numbers of all your suppliers in your purse and give copies to your bridal party. It will come in handy.

### Amplify your ceremony

Make sure your guests can see, and hear.

If people are seated further back than 15 rows back from your ceremony altar or podium, consider renting a mic and a riser.

This could range anywhere from \$50 to \$500, depending on the equipment used. You'll need to coordinate the delivery and setup with your ceremony space, so put your wedding planner or best man in charge of this task.

### Release rooms

As soon as you have picked a date, start to look for hotels in a wide variety of price points.

Many hotels allow you to reserve rooms for guests under a special wedding block and a reduced rate.

### Get organisationally focused

Before you meet with any suppliers or sign any contracts, set-up your to-do list, budgeter, and guest list manager. Get a three-ring binder to compile all

your correspondences with suppliers, notes you make during meetings, and photos or tear sheets from magazines you want suppliers to see.

### Lighten your list

The easiest way to trim your wedding budget? Cut your guest

That might seem impossible to those with large families and friends from all over the place, but consider this: Half of your wedding expenses go to wining and dining your guests. If it's costing you \$100 per person, eliminating one table of 10 can save you \$1000. Not to mention, you just took away a floral centrepiece, 10 place settings, 10 invitations, 10 bonbonniere, and more, saving you thousands.

### Make a meal plan

Another unforeseen expense? Feeding your wedding day crew. Even if it's not in the contract. you should always plan to feed your suppliers (unless you're okay with the idea of a famished and woozy photographer!). Ask them what they prefer - the same meal as your guests or something different but equally as hearty? Figure this out before you sign the contract, and then plan accordingly.

### Make a uniform kids policy

You have four choices: You can welcome children with open arms; you can decide to have an adults only wedding; you can include immediate family only; or, you can hire a child care service to provide day care either at the reception space, in a hotel room, or in a family member's home.

To prevent hurt feelings, it's wise to avoid allowing some families to bring children while excluding others (unless, of course, the children are in your bridal party).

### Listen to mother nature

Heed the weather and other

potential annoyances. Guests have been known to skip out early from hotter-thanhot summer tent weddings and improperly heated winter loft receptions.

If you're planning an outdoor wedding, make sure that you have a plan B in case of rain, and if you are planning a sunrise or sunset event, make sure you investigate the times.

### Investigate blackout dates

Know ahead of time if your wedding date falls on the same day as a conference, charity walk, or other local event that could affect traffic and hotel room availability.

If your wedding date happens to fall during a busy time, encourage your guests to reserve their rooms early.

### Check your credit

Take advantage of the high cost of weddings and sign up for a credit card with a rewards pro-

gram. Whether it gives you frequent flyer points or great shopping deals, consolidating all wedding-related purchases to one card will help you accumulate thousands of rewards points (which could be used for your honeymoon).

### Don't be afraid to ask

If you find a supplier you love who doesn't work in your price range, it never hurts to ask them for other recommendations.

Often, incredible photographers have assistants (with a similar aesthetic) who will work at a lower price point. The same goes for other categories.

### Be realistic with your time

When it comes down to the last month of your planning, look at your mile-long to-do list and cut three things, but not crucial things that you just don't feel like doing, such as picking a processional song or confirming final details with all of your suppliers.

Eliminate only the over-thetop tasks like hand-painting just married signs, or baking cookies for all of the welcome bags.

### Provide accurate directions

Make sure guests know where they're going. As easy as online map programs are to use, sometimes the directions are wrong or there's a quicker, less trafficprone route to take.

Ask your ceremony and reception sites for printouts of recommended driving directions,

which they often keep in stock for weddings and will give to you for free, and test out the routes your-

### Leave some room in your wallet

Your wedding budget should roughly follow this formula: 48 to 50 per cent of total budget to reception; eight to 10 per cent for flowers; eight to 10 per cent for attire; eight to 10 per cent for entertainment/music; 10 to 12 per cent for photo/video; three to four per cent for invites; two to three per cent for gifts; and seven per cent for miscellaneous items like a wedding coordinator.

It's essential to allocate an extra five to 10 per cent of your money for surprise expenses like printing extra invites because of mistakes, additional tailoring needs, umbrellas for a rainy day, and ribbons for the wedding pro-

### Classify your cash

Wedding budgets are all about balance.

Start your budget planning by making a list of the crucial details, like the music, your wedding gown, the invitations, the flowers, and the photographer, and assign a number to each one being the most important and three being the least.

Invest your money in all your number ones and cut corners on your number threes.
