

More time for the finer things in life

AFTER more than 25 years with the *Moree Champion* Ron Turton has decided it's time to spend more leisure time around the world.

Ronnie will have his last day at work tomorrow but says he'll be staying in Moree.

Anyone who knows him won't be surprised that while this will be his home base, he plans on attending just about every race meet you can imagine in the world, and of course returning for the local events.

He may even find time for some fishing again, and no doubt spend plenty of time with sand between his toes and catching a wave, being a bloke from Sydney's northern beaches.

Despite having such an illustrious career at with the Champion and Border News alone, Ronnie's career in fact began in the industry in 1971 and his achievements have been nothing short of astounding.

With a background in accounts, that's where Ron started at the Berrima Post, but with the advertising manager having to take leave without a replacement the 'new kid on the block' was thrown into the deep end and told to go and sell ads.

It would be one of the best things that ever happened in Ron's life.

"We were a bi-weekly based at Moss Vale so we decided to go to Bowral and we came back with all this money.

"We were seeing people that had never been approached by the Post before."

Ron recalls the first ever ad he sold.
"It was a ten by two to the local barber shop. It was my first call. I didn't really know what to say," he laughed.

"When we got back the editor nearly had a fit. The paper had to go up from a 16 to a 24 on Tuesday, and then from a 20 to 28 on the Thursday," he grinned proudly.

The general manager was based at Goulburn and rang the office to tell Ron he had been fired.

"He said, 'we can always get someone to do the books; he's the new advertising manager'," Ron explained.

"I met a lot of friendly country people and for the first time I found something I really liked," he said.

Ronnie's sales skills were so good in fact, the paper later went on to become a tri-weekly.

But, after a big stint in the bush, the city beckoned, and in 1979 Ron went to Sydney for an interview with the Daily Mirror.

The paper, owned by Murdoch, was the biggest circulated daily in the state.

Ron was hired on the spot.
"I think a lot of the local knowledge
I learnt while working on a small,
country paper went down well."

Ron started phone blowing for features for a few months and quickly became features manager.

After 18 months he became assistant advertising manager.

"That was the biggest thrill of my

life. I couldn't believe it!"

From there it was a whole new ball game with Ron landing all the big

agencies.

At the time Ron was mates with Murdoch's nephew, Matt Handbury, who had worked in New York and on the Northern Territory News, and was managing the Northern Daily Leader

"We were very good friends and he poached me to go to Tamworth. It was the hardest decision I ever made.

"Matt had a journalistic background but he must have been a damn good salesman to get me to go back to the country!"

Ron started as the advertising and marketing manager at the NDL in 1981, taking his top training from the big smoke to the country reps.

"I even got them to wear and ties and jackets, and to get them to become proud of the team."

Despite having a successful time at Tamworth, Ron's goal of becoming an advertising manager at a major metro naner seemed far away

But after two-and-a-half years Ron got a phone call to work at the new Daily Sun in Brisbane.

"It was Murdoch's newest paper. I got there on their first birthday."

Within weeks Ron was appointed ad manager and after two-and-a-half years he was appointed marketing coordinator of the Daily and Sunday Sun

During that time the paper was the first in Australia to have full colour in the run of press.

In 1987 Ronnie got the urge to travel, so he set off overseas.

When he returned he decided he wanted to get back to the country.

His mate told him about a job at Moree, and Ron knew the opportunities in the district after having travelled there while working on the NDL.

"I hopped on the bus and went for an interview with the manager, the late Jim Lemmon. He told me I needed to meet one of the owners, Geoff Farrar.

"I was given the job and attended the local races that afternoon. Both Jim and Geoff had horses running so I backed them, and they won.

"So I got off to a good start in Moree," Ron smiled.


Ron had his very first day at the Moree Champion on September 19, 1988

Ronnie was always early to work, getting in before 8.30am in Brisbane. He got off to a flying start in Moree... Trying to impress the boss he thought he'd get in 20 minutes early.

He got in and Jim was standing there, hands on hips... 'You're 10 minutes late', he exclaimed!

Ron has worked on both the Champion and the Border News during his time in Moree and was appointed site manager in 2007.

He has seen countless changes throughout his career from the days of hot metal, offset printing to computers and now the technological age – that we are still advancing in.





